CHIEF SITTING BULL KILLED

Chief Who Lead Sioux In Battle of the Little Big Horn Is Shot By Indian Police When His Warriors Try to Stop His Arrest At His Village On Grand River

Chief Sitting Bull was shot to death today after his warriors tried to prevent his arrest by Indian Police. Eight Indians, including Sitting Bull's son, Crowfoot, were also killed, as were six of the police. After the battle of the

Little Big Horn, Sitting Bull escaped to Canada, but returned to the United States after being promised a pardon. He then appeared in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, but lately he has been urging the Sioux not to sell their lands.

Since Sitting Bull's return to the U. S. the strange religious craze of the Ghost Dance has spread among the Indians, who believe that a Messiah is coming to free them from the oppression of the white man.
